This issue of the OLBI Working Papers marks a new stage in the journal's evolution, with several exciting changes already implemented and additional new initiatives underway. We have transitioned to a new online management platform, the Open Journal Systems (OJS) developed by the Public Knowledge Project (PKP), a multi-university initiative to create open source software and improve the quality of scholarly publishing. Introducing the OJS has been a success for us, as it has helped streamline the submission, review, editing, production and dissemination processes. Another important new development is that all of our articles now have digital object identifiers (DOI). I am also happy to announce that the OLBI Working Papers has found a new physical and virtual home within OLBI's structure: the Julien Couture Resource Centre (JCRC). This step contributes not only to enriching the Centre's existing collections but also allows the publication to benefit from increased visibility and professional support. In addition, we have established an important partnership with the University of Ottawa's Morisset Library and now take part in their open access initiatives. This has enabled us to access additional services and expertise on the one hand, and has further positioned the OLBI as a patron of open access on the other. Overall, this new issue reaffirms our continued commitment to scholarship, free flow of information, and knowledge exchange.
