STUDENT ESSAY AWARDS IN BYZANTINE STUDIES

Four prizes (\$300.00 each for two graduate and \$200.00 each for two advanced undergraduate student essays) will be offered annually by the Greek-Canadian Association of Constantinople (Toronto) on any topic of Byzantine Studies. The competition was announced and began this year. It is open to students enrolled in Universities and Colleges in Ontario. The Association hopes to be able to extend the awards to other provinces and throughout Canada in the near future. The announcement for this years' competition was circulated in March to all Universities and Colleges in Ontario. The deadline for submitting entries was June 30, 1993. The results will be announced in November. The essays are to be evaluated by a three-member Committee appointed by the CCB and the Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies. The 1993 Committee members are Professors Sheila Campbell (PIMS), Helen Saradi (Univ. of Guelph) and Daniel Sahas (Univ. of Waterloo).

The following essays were submitted this year:

- "The ethos of the Byzantine iconographer: The case of Dionysius of Fourna".
- "Fresh Paint on a House with a crumbling Foundation. The state of Orthodoxy in nineteenth-century Russia".
- "Roman primacy as the cause of the split between Eastern and Western Christianity".
- "The Age of Apocalypse: Plato, Aristotle and the Demise of Byzantium".
- "Origins of the First Crusade".
- "Byzantine Benevolence: Philanthropy in the Later Roman Empire".
- "The Heresy Trial of John Italos". [Graduate essay submission]

We publish the essay titles anonymously as an indication of the little known but very real interest in Byzantine studies in Canada among graduate and undergraduate students. This must be a cause of pride and an incentive for all Byzantinists. The CCB is happy to have been invited to assist in the administration of this competition and through this means to encourage such endeavours.

The same organization also ["Greek-Canadian Association of Constantinople" (P.O. Box 202, Station F, Toronto, ON. M4Y 2L5)], in co-operation with the Canadian Committee of Byzantinists and the Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies, sponsors the "Constantinople and Its Legacy" Annual Lectures. Two such lectures have been offered thus far:

- 1992 Helen Saradi: "Byzantium and the Origin of the Modern Greek National Consciousness".
- 1993 Daniel Sahas: "Byzantium and Islam: An Encounter of two Theocracies. Mutual Admiration and Exclusion".

The lectures have been published and are available from the Association at a nominal price.
